From The Chair Of Governors

We have had two Curriculum meetings this term to review the pupil outcomes from last year looking at the attainment and progress across the school not just the SATs. We have used this analysis to inform the targets set for each class for the end of the summer term taking account of the start point for each pupil. We have also had updates on how the Art, Design Technology and Computing curricula have been developed to increase the consistency of teaching and learning in these subjects across the school.

We have had one Resources Committee meeting this term where we received the final outturn figures for the year ended 31 st August 2024 and approved all the financial and premises policies required. As with many schools across the country our budget is very tight, and we really appreciate the funds raised through the PTA and other sources of income such as grants from charitable trusts or businesses which enable us to offer a wider range of learning opportunities and resources than we could otherwise afford.

We will be reviewing our 3- year budget forecast in our next Resources meeting in the light of the changes in Government policy and other external factors such as the falling birth rate and the shortage of affordable housing in Ealing.

We have also had two Pay Committee meetings to conduct the annual review of staff pay and the impact of the cost-of-living awards for teachers and support staff and two Full Governing Board meetings, so it has been a very busy term. We have approved several policies including the new attendance policy which reflects the increases in fines for unauthorised term time absences. We have also reviewed our safeguarding policy together with our on-line safety policy in the light of the increasing use of gaming apps to groom children. Please help us to keep children safe by discussing keeping safe on- line with your children. We have welcomed Miss Chatrath as a second Staff Governor and will be looking to fill our only current vacancy for a Co-Opted Governor in the New Year.

We would like to thank all our parents and carers for supporting us in increasing our pupils' attendance at school and reducing the instances of lateness. Good attendance and punctuality will really help your children reach age related expectations because they are not trying to catch up on the learning they have missed as well as keep up in class.





We learned about how people celebrate Diwali and made salt dough divas.














We have been learning about different communities and enjoyed cooking plantain and making African style necklaces to celebrate Black History Month

We read the 'Three Little pigs' and learnt about different materials.



The children have been learning about being brave, using their imagination, and enjoying rhyming words. They had fun acting out parts of the The Gruffalo by Julia Donaldson.






Reception continued...

Year 1



This term in English we read 'The Tiger Who Came to Tea' We had lots of fun making puppets and reenacting the story.











We created our own characters and wrote our own versions of the story. We really enjoyed our Tiger tea party.



Next we read 'Sharing a Shell'. We explored the story and thought about how the different characters might be feeling. We then looked at instructions. We made our own hermit crabs and then wrote instructions on how to make them.















In maths we used lots of cubes and counters to explore number. We learned how to use the part whole model and also did addition and subtraction within 10.



In geography we have been thinking about What it is like at Woodlands. We found out about human and physical features. We looked at aerial views and maps. We then created our own 3D maps of the school.









We explored different ways to draw lines in Art.





This term is science we have finding out about animals including humans. We identified different animals around school, and learned that we can sort animals into different groups based on characteristics and diets. We then looked at humans, naming body parts and exploring our senses. We did an experiment using our sense of smell.









Year 2

This term, Woodpeckers have been busy writing stories. We have also written some instructions to help us with our DT!

We tested different 3D shapes and their strength. The strongest tested shape was chosen to help us build our chairs!














We took photos using close ups of buildings, action shots of people and something in the distance. Have a look at our digital photography skills!





We know how useful Information Technology (IT) can be.












It's important to ask for people's permission before you take a photo. That's exactly what we did!

The Great Fire of London trip at Guildhall Art Gallery.








We saw a figure of Samuel Pepys. We also drew our own monument designs for the Great Fire of London; dressed in role and looked at some maps.
